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INTRODUCTION

We started the Muslim Jewish Conference more than 10 years ago. We have committed over a decade to forming innovative networks of cooperation amongst a new generation of Muslim and Jewish change makers, entrepreneurs, and allies.

We have managed to become not only one of the main conveners of grassroots and young leaders as well as experts in this field but also a very efficient one – with a budget of less than 1,000,000 Euros from 2010 to 2020. Our reputation is known in international organizations such as the United Nations or the Organization for Security

and Cooperation in Europe as well as embassies and consulates throughout this world. We have convened more than 1,500 multipliers through the Muslim Jewish Conference and the Connecting Action summits with a minimum of resources. We only dare to imagine what we could be able to achieve with more support.

We have provided a safe space to experiment with and envision new ways of advancing the work of the MJC on local, regional, and global levels, empowering bold and innovative activities. From working with refugees and organizing speakers' corners to delivering food to those in need in times of crisis, our International community is used to reacting to urgent matters while the MJA strategizes on crucial long-term issues.

With this in mind, the Muslim Jewish Alliance aims to create and sustain the necessary connections and connect actions to enhance mutual understanding, respect and cooperation among young entrepreneurs, civil society leaders, organizations and institutions.

Over the past 10 years, we have proven that the MJC can impact both individual actors and the entire interfaith movement. As the MJA, we are now more than a conference and an event-based organization: we are a mission-driven movement.

CONTEXT

Building on the success of its annual conference, the MJC leadership incorporated the Muslim Jewish Alliance (MJA), an entity that includes the annual MJC as well as other programs.

MISSION

The MJA seeks to initiate and strengthen networking platforms for existing interfaith and dialogue institutions as well as hubs for activists and ongoing activities in this field. The MJA aims to foster innovative cooperation between Muslim and Jewish communities by encouraging dialogue between, and leadership by, a new generation civil society of leaders, educators, academics, dialogue facilitators, and parents committed to a more peaceful and cooperative world.

VISION

The MJA envisions a world where interfaith and dialogue organizations collaborate with one another to maximize their impact and outreach.

APPROACH

The MJA will provide the space and the home that is desperately needed for the global family of Muslims and Jews who are seeking to change the realities on the ground. Hundreds of alumni reaching thousands of activists are trying to make a difference in their communities, but lack the resources, knowledge, expertise, and partners to do so. Through the pillars detailed in the following pages and listed below, the MJA will solve this problem by establishing a hub of knowledge, ideas, and experiences, and developing mutual by and professionally guided support.



THE MUSLIM JEWISH CONFERENCE

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MISSION

The Muslim Jewish Conference is a grassroots dialogue and leadership initiative that focuses on building sustainable networks between Muslim and Jewish leaders from around the world. The annual conference brings together students and young professionals and invites them to step beyond the boundaries of ignorance and stereotyping in order to build a new global political movement of young Muslim and Jewish leaders, activists and experts who are committed to mutual respect. Conference participants, who belong to all faiths and affiliations, work together to develop and implement projects focused on promoting interfaith and cross-cultural dialogue.

VISION

MJC envisions a world where global Muslim and Jewish communities exhibit mutual understanding and respect and cooperate to enhance and preserve peace and prosperity. MJC envisions itself as a perpetual creator and sustainer of relationships among global Muslim and Jewish communities to help them talk to each other, instead of about each other.



HISTORY

Since its founding in 2010, the MJC has hosted a conference every year in cities including: Vienna, Austria; Kiev, Ukraine; Bratislava, Slovakia; Sarajevo, Bosnia and Herzegovina; Berlin, Germany; and Paris, France.

APPROACH

The MJC hosts annual, week-long conferences that provide a safe space for ~150 global participants and staff to engage in meaningful dialogue on topics including: confronting stereotypes, discrimination and prejudice, the religion of "the other," interfaith and intra-faith dialogue, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and genocide awareness. A major initiative during the week is "sharing the pain," where we visit memorial sites of genocide having affected both communities (Srebrenica 2013 & 2017, Mauthausen 2014, Babi Yar 2011, Sachsenhausen 2016). Visits to holy sites are also included in the program. Participants co-produce grassroots projects, including programs focused on tolerance and education, interfaith or art, which create global and local impact.



ORGANIZATION

The MJC is led by professionals based in Vienna, Austria and supported by a robust team of volunteers from across the world, including North and South America, Europe, the Middle Australia, and Africa. MJC maintains a network of over 1,500 alumni across more than 60 countries, who work in their own communities to promote the vision and support alumni-led projects that amplify the message of peaceful dialogue, rippling the effect of conference. Furthermore. spearhead the attempt to create local chapters around the globe and spread the MJC's vision while creating change on the ground.

LOOKING AHEAD

The 13th annual MJC will be held in 2022 in a hybrid format, in order to accommodate participants from all over the globe with special focus and support for local hubs. The conference will span multiple days and will incorporate skill-building work-shops, project incubation sessions and presentations as well as thematic working groups. The conference will invite both new partic-ipants and MJC alumni in order to focus on building alumni projects and local chapters.

ALUMNI PROJECTS

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MISSION

In order to take home and bring to life the vision of the MJA worldwide, notable alumni of the MJC and MJA initiatives are invited to engage in collaborative projects which were incubated and inspired during their respective experiences over the last ten years.

The goal is to enable, encourage and support cross-cultural initiatives that provide young drivers of change with a framework for establishing vital connections and joint action, through the exchange of knowledge, ideas, and experiences.

APPROACH

One of the main roles fulfilled by the MJC in previous years is that of a project incubator. During the Muslim Jewish Conference and during local meetings by alumni, countless project ideas were born and incubated.

To encourage ongoing communication and contact among participants and alumni, they will be invited to design projects and implement these initiatives throughout the year. This work will be supported by a professional Project Development and Implementation Department within the MJA.

The Muslim Jewish Alliance will provide incentives, knowledge and structure to allow MJA Alumni to co-create concrete impact. Alumni projects and project ideas have



included: The "Lighthouse," a community house for young activists and creators from the MENA (Middle East and North Africa) region, to examine, research and catalyze regenerative social change within their communities and the region as a whole: The "Faith in Youth" Project within the Blackburn with Darwen Interfaith Forum, which increases public knowledge and mutual understanding between different faith communities in West England; and The "Diversity Network," a team of young Muslim, Jewish and Christian professionals who are well trained in the skills of conflict resolution, who work together dealing with the differences amongst themselves and as a facilitation team conducting training workshops for young adults all around the nation in Argentina. Each year, one selected alumni project will receive 5-10,000 EUR in seed-funding: a microgrant that allows for macro impact.

Implementing the ideas we have conceptualized at the MJC throughout the last decade would provide the impact and long-lasting change we are seeking to develop.

MUSLIM JEWISH FELLOWSHIP

MISSION

The MJA Fellowship will be a special community among the MJC Alumni. Through the constitution of a high-level network of exceptional alumni and partners leading outstanding ideas, we advance the MJA's mission and impact on a global scale. These exceptional drivers of change and experienced leaders in their fields will be empowering Muslim-Jewish interaction and impact, redefining effective engagement.

APPROACH

Through personal and professional development networking and support the MJA Fellows are to take an active role in designing, driving and creating the change they envision. The MJA will connect exceptionally creative and innovative members in our community and link them with various international and local networks of change, influencing political and social landscapes alike. Built on the MJC's 13 years of experience fostering trust-building, skill-building, and coalition-building the Muslim Fellowship will provide young leaders in interfaith work with a forum to exchange best practice, develop skills and improve their work through an interdisciplinary curriculum. In cooperation with other organizations and initiatives, the Fellows will benefit from a divers expertise to help them fortify the impact of this work together.





LOCAL CHAPTERS

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MISSION


The MJA will expand its focus, serving as a platform for Muslim- and Jewish-led initiatives and providing educational resources to communities, institutions, academics, and the media on topics relevant to Muslim-Jewish relations. By creating a global community, local and regional alumni-led coalitions will be supported, guided and trained to best address issues relevant to their unique circumstances and to change local and regional realities. Selecting a group of trusted alumni to lead one chapter and support it throughout its first year of existence can provide local change and connect it with the necessary coalitions, thereby strengthening a global movement.

APPROACH

Utilizing our roster of skilled activists, experienced educators and our established reputation as a leader in the field, we will provide guidance to alumni and activists who are already working on creating local MJA chapters as well as new organizations working in these areas. The main goal is to create more safe spaces and continue Muslim-Jewish cooperation at the local level. These local chapters will remain connected to a global alliance for a culture of constructive engagement.

Local chapters will address the specific needs of the local and regional communities by implementing best practices and approaches. Each local chapter will organize multiple internal and public-facing events throughout the year, and will produce reports on local challenges and innovative solutions to be distributed to the MJA and its networks. Local chapters will thereby spread the MJA's mission to achieve immediate, on-the-ground impact in the fields of dialogue and conflict resolution, while also contributing local expertise to broaden the MJA's global perspective.

In uncertain times that pose challenges to international gatherings due to COVID-19, the importance of local chapters becomes even more urgent.

MUSLIM JEWISH ART & CULTURE FESTIVALS

MISSION

The Muslim Jewish Festival, or "MJFestival" is a platform for Muslim and Jewish artists, communities and initiatives to celebrate the diversity of Muslim and Jewish life. The goal is twofold: to empower young Muslims and Jews to portray their artistic and active societal engagement to a broad audience, and to educate the audience about the diversity of Muslim and Jewish communities.

APPROACH

We particularly aim to promote visibility of the creative work coming from both Muslim and Jewish communities. In 2022, the MuJew Festival carried on 2021's first iteration, which took place during the "1700 years of Jewish life in Germany" events by continuing to showcase the presence of Muslim and Jewish life and art in Germany and beyond. Following editions of the Festival can also contribute to a first digital archive of contemporary Muslim and Jewish art and cultural production.

As a platform that showcases the diversity and creativity of Muslim and Jewish life the Muslim Jewish Festival lies at the intersection of religion, art and culture.



CONNECTING ACTION INTERNATIONAL



MISSION

Connecting Action International will be an international network of intercultural, interfaith and grassroots organisations, as well as experts who can share best practices in various fields and reinforce collaboration where possible or necessary.


APPROACH





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THE TEAM

ILJA SICHROVSKY is the Founder and Co-Director of the Muslim Jewish Conference (MJC). Born in Berlin, he is the son of a German mother and an Austrian father. His family has Jewish roots in Vienna dating back centuries with one of his Jewish ancestors being among the first Jews knighted by Franz Josef. Ilja was a counselor in Vienna's Hashomer Hatzair youth movement and was a founding member of Gesher, the youth party within the Austrian Jewish Community. Ilja represented the University of Vienna three times at international Harvard student conferences. On each occasion, he won the Harvard Award for Exemplifying the True Spirit of Diplomacy. Later, he acted as faculty adviser and coach for the Viennese delegation at several conferences. Ilja wrote a scientific article about being a Jewish student studying at an Austrian University six decades after the Holocaust. It was published by the University of Vienna and integrated into curricula. He is member of the ROI community and a recipient of the Schusterman Foundation Fellowship.

SAMI ELMANSOURY is a public speaker and writer on issues ranging from education and national security, to faith and identity He currently serves on Immigrant Rights Task Force of the Office of the Borough President of Manhattan, as a Founding Member of the US Department of State's Generation Change initiative, and on the Boards of Advisors of both World Faith and the New Leaders Council of New Jersey. a nationwide fellowship that seeks to train and mentor the next generation of young leaders in both business entrepreneurship and social entrepreneurship.



ALAN DOSORETZ is originally from Buenos Aires, Argentina, and now lives in Israel. He is the co-founder of the Diversity Network, an Argentinean interfaith Abrahamic initiative for coexistence. In 2019, Alan completed an MA in Peace and Conflict Management at the University of Haifa. He also holds a specialization in Multi-Track Diplomacy and Conflict Transformation from the University of Maryland. In Argentina, he worked for seven years as the Executive Director of Argentina Ciudadana, a Latin American non-profit organization dedicated to encouraging citizens to become more involved in civic life. Between 2015 to 2018, Alan also worked in the Argentinean Government first at the Ministry of Environment and Sustainable Development (2015-2017) and then at the Ministry of Justice and Human Rights (2017-2018) in the National Office of Mediation and Conflict Resolution. He is a member of the ROI community, a fellow of the Konrad Adenauer Stiftung, and a scholar of the Topol Family Foundation.



MOHAMED ABUBAKR is the Co-Director of the Muslim Jewish Conference. He is a Sudanese human rights activist and peacemaker with a decade and a half of civil society experience. Since high school, he has founded and led organizations and initiatives focused on humanitarian, human rights, youth empowerment and peace programs across the Middle East and Africa (MEA) including in Darfur, South Sudan, Sudan, Egypt, Israel, the Palestinian Territories and beyond. Mohamed has also documented, reported and mobilized against human rights abuses across MEA, and since arriving in the United States has become a sought after voice at the State Department and in Congress concerning policy and human rights issues in the region. Mohamed is the President of AMEL - The African Middle Eastern Leadership Project.

RAFAEL TYSZBLAT is an expert in conflict resolution, mediation, intercultural and interconfessional dialogue. He has been the Director of Programming at the Muslim-Jewish Conference since 2013. He recently launched the initiative of a Coalition of Civil Society Organizations for Intercultural and interconfessional dialogue through Connecting Actions and is the Innovation and Program Design Manager at Soliya, an online-based NGO promoting the field of Virtual Exchange.
